

Residents are eligible for Homeless Prevention if they meet the following criteria:

- Are from the at-risk of homelessness definition (as long as they have an income at or below 50% of AMI).
- Are at risk of losing current permanent housing (e.g. eviction) or have found alternative housing to move into.
- Owe up to six months of rental payments, and/or utility arrears/deposits/assistance.

Eligible costs include:

- Rental Assistance: rental assistance and rental arrears.
- Financial assistance: rental application fees, security and utility deposits, utility payments, and moving costs.

About Homeless Prevention

The Homeless Prevention program aims to prevent an individual or family from eviction from their current housing through providing short— and/or medium-term assistance.

Assistance is only available to the extent necessary to help an individual or family regain stability in their current housing or move into other permanent housing. An eviction notice is required to apply for this program.

Payments are made on behalf of the applicant to third parties for security deposits, six months of rental arrears, as well as utility arrears/deposits/assistance.

A Safe Dwelling is provided for you and your children.

An Advocacy Program can help you through family court, criminal court, police departments and Child Protective Services.

A Counseling Program provides you with individual counseling and an educational support group.

A therapeutic support group is available for children who have witnessed domestic violence.

A Community Outreach Program provides community members with education, training, and information about domestic violence response and prevention
